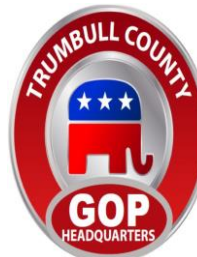

LOYCHIK INTRODUCES LEGISLATION REQUIRING SCHOOL BOARD MEMBERS TO DECLARE POLITICAL AFFILIATION

COLUMBUS– State Representative Mike Loychik (R-Bazetta) introduced legislation requiring candidates running for state and local boards of education to declare a political affiliation.

By declaring a party, candidates will participate in primaries instead of being listed on a nonpartisan ballot.

“Partisan elections for school board members will allow voters to get a better idea of what the candidate’s platforms are,” said Loychik. “It is important that we give voters information that will allow them to make an informed decision, especially when they’re voting for those who decide our children’s educational opportunities.” House Bill 267 will have its first hearing in committee late October.

CONGRESSMAN JOYCE PASSES HOMELAND SECURITY APPROPRIATIONS BILL IN THE HOUSE

WASHINGTON, DC – Today, the Fiscal Year 2024 (FY24) House Appropriations Homeland Security bill, authored by Subcommittee Chairman Dave Joyce (OH-14), passed the U.S. House of Representatives.

“One of the most pressing challenges this country faces is the border security crisis that has raged under the Biden Administration,” said Congressman Joyce, Chairman of the House Appropriations Homeland Security Subcommittee. “The funding in this bill to build the wall, increase the number of Border Patrol agents, and bolster border technology, forces the Biden Administration to finally address the border security crisis. Thank you to Chairwoman Granger and my colleagues in the House for supporting this important legislation.”

“The FY24 Homeland Security bill continues our efforts to address the ongoing border crisis with targeted funding and policy restrictions that complement H.R. 2, the Secure the Border Act. This bill increases the number of Border Patrol Agents to its highest level ever, provides millions for border security technology, and forces the Administration to build the wall. It’s a strong bill, and I thank Chairman Joyce for his hard work and efforts to get this important piece of legislation passed the House,” said Chairwoman Kay Granger, Chairwoman of the House Appropriations Committee.

JOYCE, STEFANIK, CASE INTRODUCE LEGISLATION TO PREVENT CCP INFLUENCE IN AMERICA’S CLASSROOMS

WASHINGTON DC – Today, Congressman Dave Joyce (R-OH), House Republican Conference Chairwoman Elise Stefanik (R-NY) and Congressman Ed Case (D-HI) introduced the Combating the Lies of Authoritarians in School Systems (CLASS) Act. This bipartisan legislation prohibits K-12 public schools from accepting funds or entering into contracts with the Chinese Government, the Chinese Communist Party, and individuals or entities with ties to either.

“As students across the country start the new school year, the Chinese Communist Party is hard at work attempting to influence their curriculum. China’s attempts to interfere in American classrooms represent a direct threat to the national security of our country,” **said Congressman Joyce**. “This bipartisan legislation is a crucial step in preventing China’s influence from spreading into the American education system. Thank you to Chairwoman Stefanik and Congressman Case for their support in protecting our young minds in Ohio and across the country.”

“American students are being force fed Chinese Communist Party propaganda as school systems nationwide accept significant funding from CCP linked financial institutions. In New York alone, China’s infiltration into New York schools totaled to a shocking \$375,575 in CCP connecting funding. No price can be put on the minds of our next generation. As the new school year begins, Communist China cannot be allowed access to our classrooms and students,” **said Congresswoman Elise Stefanik**. “I am proud to help introduce this bipartisan legislation, The Combating the Lies of Authoritarians in School Systems (CLASS) Act, with my colleagues Rep. Dave Joyce and Rep. Ed Case to block Communist China from having a seat in any American classroom.”

“The People’s Republic of China and the Chinese Communist Party have demonstrated repeatedly that there are no boundaries in the deliberate spread of propaganda and disinformation, including the classrooms of the world,” **said Congressman Ed Case**. “We can and should value real cultural exchange to foster mutual goodwill and understanding, but we must be eyes wide open to exploitation of our best intentions in our most valued institutions.”

A slew of Freedom of Information Act (FOIA) requests have uncovered that more than 140 school districts around the United States have received money directly from the Chinese Government or through intermediaries connected to the ruling Chinese Communist Party. These funding arrangements are rarely disclosed to parents, and often are conditional upon school districts allowing the Chinese government to vet which teachers are going to teach in American schools and what information is conveyed to students. The CLASS Act bans school districts from accepting any funds from the People’s Republic of China or individuals and entities with ties to the government, and requires school districts to disclose any time they receive funding from other foreign governments.

November 2023 - Issue 2 Talking Points

On November 7, 2023, Ohioans will vote on an initiated statute to legalize recreational marijuana in Ohio. Summary and full text can be found [here](#). The Ohio Republican Party has formally endorsed the “No” position.

Strategic Points:

- “No” protects the safety, well-being, and development of Ohio’s children.
- Legalizing marijuana would be a “[nightmare](#)” for law enforcement and healthcare communities.
- Legalization would hurt thousands of workers and businesses.

Supporting Facts:

- **“No” Protects the safety, well being, and development of Ohio's children.**
 - Leads to increased use by underage kids and small children could consume marijuana-laced foods that look like candy.
 - In states like New York that have legalized marijuana, there have been [surges in kids getting sick](#) after accidentally eating cannabis candy.
 - As more states legalized marijuana, between 2017 and 2021, the number of very young children eating edible forms of marijuana [spiked dramatically](#), with many kids ending up in hospitals.
 - In 2021, over [3,000 young children](#) accidentally ate weed edibles.
- **Legalizing marijuana would be a “[nightmare](#)” for law enforcement and healthcare communities**
 - Issue 2 is [opposed](#) by law enforcement associations, such as the Ohio Fraternal Order of Police and Sheriffs Association, and medical ones, such as the Ohio Children’s Hospital Association.
 - Will lead to more impaired driving deaths, accidental ingestions, and other serious public safety concerns.
- **Legalization would hurt thousands of workers and businesses.**
 - [Ohio Manufacturers Urge No Vote](#) on Recreational Marijuana
 - Cites worker safety, absenteeism, rising insurance expenses, and the already low rate of employment participation if this measure were to pass.
 - More difficult to fill manufacturing and other jobs that will continue to require drug tests for workplace safety purposes, passing the burden onto businesses.

Opposition Arguments:

- Marijuana is similar to alcohol, and free adults should be allowed to make their own choices.
- Increased tax revenue would provide a major boost to the state.
- Marijuana is a safer alternative to alcohol and more dangerous drugs.
- Strict regulations will ensure a high-quality, safe product, that is removed from the criminal enterprises who traditionally control the industry.

2. FINDINGS RELATED TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS REQUIRED TO BE REPORTED IN ACCORDANCE WITH GAGAS

1. Cash Reconciliation - Municipal Court

FINDING NUMBER 2022-001

SIGNIFICANT DEFICIENCY

Sound accounting practices require that when designing the public office's system of internal control and the specific control activities, management should ensure adequate security of assets and records, and verify the existence and valuation of assets and liabilities and periodically reconcile them to the accounting records.

The reconciliation of cash (bank) balances to accounting system records (book) to the accounting system is the most basic and primary control process performed. Lack of completing an accurate and timely reconciliation may allow for accounting errors, theft and fraud to occur without timely detection.

The Senior Court Accountant, with assistance from the Clerk of Courts, is responsible for reconciling the book (fund) balance to the total bank balance on a monthly basis, and the Clerk of Courts and Judge are responsible for reviewing the reconciliation and related support.

The Clerk of Court's office prepared bank versus book reconciliations each month however, these reconciliations were not complete and accurate. From the December 31, 2022, reconciliation, we concluded the total fund balances exceeded the adjusted bank balances in the amount of \$16,078. Failure to reconcile monthly increases the possibility that the Court will not be able to identify, assemble, analyze, classify, and record its transactions correctly or to document compliance with finance related legal and contractual requirements. Further, the lack of accurate monthly reconciliations increases the risk of theft/fraud over the cash cycle and could lead to inaccurate reporting in the annual financial statements.

Significant reconciling issues may result in unauditible declarations, findings for recovery, findings for adjustment, and/or opinion modifications.

The Senior Court Accountant and Clerk of Courts should record all transactions and prepare monthly bank to book cash reconciliations, which include all bank accounts and all fund balances. The reconciliation should be in a concise format clearly documenting all balances and reconciling adjustments. The reconciliation should be signed by the Senior Court Accountant and Clerk of Courts. Variances should be investigated, documented and corrected. In addition, the Judge should review the monthly cash reconciliation including the related support (such as reconciling items) and document the reviews.

Official's Response: We have still been working with the vendor on trying to balance bank to book. We have pinpointed several areas that need to be addressed in the accounting system that is owned by Pioneer Technologies. However, we are still working through this. I know it should not take this long, but we are at the mercy of the vendor. There is nothing we'd like more than to be able to balance all these accounts and fund balances. We will continue to work toward that goal.

Financial Reporting

FINDING NUMBER 2022-002

SIGNIFICANT DEFICIENCY

In our audit engagement letter, as required by AU-C Section 210, Terms of Engagement, paragraph .06, management acknowledged its responsibility for the preparation and fair presentation of their financial statements; this responsibility includes designing, implementing and maintaining internal control relevant to preparing and fairly presenting financial statements free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error as discussed in AU-C Section 210 paragraphs .A14 & .A16. Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) Cod. 1100 paragraph .101 states a governmental accounting system must make it possible both: (a) to present fairly and with full disclosure the funds and activities of the governmental unit in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles, and (b) to determine and demonstrate compliance with finance-related legal and contractual provisions.

The City understated Sewer Fund contracts payable and capital assets in the amount of \$1,746,862 (check #10596) related to the WPCC & Pump Station Improvement project. In addition, the City overstated OPEB Deferred Outflows and understated Pension Expense in the amounts of \$413,958 for Governmental Type Activities ; \$603,913 for Business Type Activities which includes \$307,896 for the Water Fund, \$209,432 for the Sewer Fund, \$73,196 for Sanitation Fund, and \$13,389 for Stormwater Fund ; \$17,438 for Data Processing Fund ; and \$55,503 for Health District Component Unit.

The City did not have adequate controls in place to prevent or detect these errors. The City has corrected their financial statements for these errors.

The City should review the accounting system reports, GAAP compilation workpapers, and basic financial statements as applicable to help ensure all amounts are properly classified and recorded.

Official's Response: The city will review future reports, documents and statements to better assure all future amounts are properly documented.

Payroll Overpayment - Finding for Recovery – Resolved Under Audit

FINDING NUMBER 2022-003

Eddie Colbert worked as a Director of Public Safety and Service for the City of Warren with approved salary through Ordinance #12153/09 of \$82,825.18. During 2021, Eddie received a 2% increase in pay that he should not have received resulting in a new salary of \$84,481.68. As a result, a total overpayment of \$3,878.40 occurred from 2021 through 2023 until the rate was corrected in the system. See calculation below.

In accordance with the foregoing facts, and pursuant to Ohio Rev. Code § 117.28, a Finding for Recovery for public money illegally expended is hereby issued against Eddie Colbert for \$3,878 and in favor of the City's General Fund.

FULL TEXT OF PROPOSED AMENDMENT

Be it Resolved by the People of the State of Ohio that Article I of the Ohio Constitution is amended to add the following Section:

Article I, Section 22. The Right to Reproductive Freedom with Protections for Health and Safety (mostly for abortion providers)

A. Every individual has a right to make and carry out one's own reproductive decisions) including but not limited to decisions on:

1. contraception;
2. fertility treatment;
3. continuing one's own pregnancy;
4. miscarriage care; and
5. abortion.

B. The State shall not directly or indirectly, burden, penalize, prohibit, interfere with, or discriminate against either:

1. An individual's voluntary exercise of this right or
2. A person or entity that assists an individual exercising this right,

unless the State demonstrates that it is using the least restrictive means to advance the individual's health in accordance with widely accepted and evidence-based standards of care.

However, abortion may be prohibited after fetal viability. But in no case may such an abortion be prohibited if in the professional judgment of the pregnant patient's treating physician it is necessary to protect the pregnant patient's life or health.

C. As used in this Section:

1. "Fetal viability" means "the point in a pregnancy when, in the professional judgment of the pregnant patient's treating physician, the fetus has a significant likelihood of survival outside the uterus with reasonable measures. This is determined on a case-by-case basis."
2. "State" includes any governmental entity and any political subdivision.

D. This Section is self-executing.

FINAL THOUGHT

The Ohio Legislature will have NO power to mitigate against the abuse of this language, because this is a Constitutional right. Thus, the people of Ohio will be silenced on this subject.
